Quick Review

Poems can have rhyme, beats, and repeated lines. Rhyming words end with the same sound. Repeated lines and a steady beat give a poem its rhythm.

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Explanations	
1. B	The line 'Grow, little seed, grow!' is repeated in the poem.
2. A	'Ground' and 'around' end with the same sound, so they rhyme.
3. B	'Bright' and 'light' end with the same sound.
4. B	The poem follows a seed as it grows into a flower.
5. B	The repeated line adds rhythm and shows the poet's wish.
6. B	In the second part, a flower shows and smells sweet.
7. B	The poem about a growing flower feels happy and hopeful.
8. T	'Blue' and 'new' end with the same sound, so they rhyme.
9.	Answer: Example: feed, need, weed, read, bead. Accept any real word that ends with the same sound as 'seed'.
10.	Answer: Example: to show how plants change and grow with sun and water. Accept any thoughtful answer about growth or nature.



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
