Quick Review

When two stories have the same characters or theme, look for what is the **SAME** and what is **DIFFERENT**. Compare the **SETTING** (where), the **PROBLEM**, and the **LESSON**.

PART 1 — READ

Read the passage. Then answer the questions.

Two Stories About Frog

Story 1 — Frog at the Pond. Frog wanted to find the biggest lily pad. He hopped to the far side of the pond, even though his friends warned him about loud splashes. He found a giant pad, but a big fish came up and almost ate him. Frog hopped home and decided that smaller lily pads were just fine.

Story 2 — Frog in the Garden. Frog wanted to find the tastiest bug. He hopped past the safe rocks to the deep grass, even though his friends warned him. A garden snake popped out, and Frog had to jump fast to get away. Back at home, Frog said small bugs near the rocks tasted just fine.

- How are the **SETTINGS** different?
 - One is at school, one is at home.
 - Story 1 happens at the pond; Story 2 happens in the garden.
 - They have the same setting.
 - Both happen in space.
- What is the **SAME** problem in both stories?
 - Frog cannot swim.
 - Frog wants something big or special and runs into danger.
 - Frog cannot find his friends.
 - Frog is hungry.

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Explanations	
1. C	Both stories are about Frog.
2. B	Different places, same character.
3. B	Both stories have Frog reaching too far and meeting danger.
4. B	Both stories end with Frog choosing the small / safe option. A is the opposite of the lesson; C is partly true but the stories actually show Frog learning AFTER ignoring friends; D is not in either story.
5. C	The dangers differ even though the pattern is the same.
6. B	Both passages mention that his friends warned him.
7.	Answer: Example: the place (pond vs. garden), what Frog is looking for (lily pad vs. bug), the danger (fish vs. snake). Any clear difference between the two stories.
8.	Answer: Example: Frog is the main character. Frog ignores warnings. Frog escapes danger. Frog decides small is fine at the end. Any clear similarity between the two stories.
9. A	Same character + same theme + different settings is a way to teach a lesson twice.
10. A	By the end of each story, Frog is more careful.



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
