## Two Articles About Bats

**Article 1 — Why Bats Are Helpful.** Bats are quiet helpers of the night. A small brown bat can eat about 1,000 mosquitoes in just one hour. That means fewer itchy bites for people in summer. Bats also help farmers because they eat insects that damage crops. Many farmers say their gardens grow better when bats live nearby.

**Article 2 — Why Bats Are Misunderstood.** Many people are afraid of bats. They think bats want to fly into people's hair, but this is not true. Bats use sounds to find their way and can fly past us easily in the dark. Most bats are gentle and prefer to stay away from people. Learning the truth about bats helps people respect these animals.

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Explanations	
<b>1. B</b>	Both articles focus on bats with a positive view. A is wrong (same topic); C and D miss the shared message.
<b>2. B</b>	The two articles share the topic but take different angles. A is wrong; C/D are not the right kind of difference.
<b>3. B</b>	Eating mosquitoes is direct help. A and D are from Article 2; C is the opposite of helpful.
<b>4. B</b>	B addresses the fear about bats flying into hair. A,C,D are from Article 1 and don't speak to the fear.
<b>5. B</b>	Both articles speak positively about bats. The others contradict at least one article.
<b>6.</b>	<b>Answer:</b> Examples: bats eat 1,000 mosquitoes in an hour; farmers say their gardens grow better with bats; bats eat insects that damage crops. Any helping-bats fact from Article 1.
<b>7.</b>	<b>Answer:</b> Examples: people are afraid of bats but bats won't fly into hair; bats use sounds to find their way; most bats prefer to stay away from people. Any fear/misunderstanding fact from Article 2.
<b>8. A</b>	Two articles often cover different parts of the same topic on purpose. B is unfair; C is a guess; D is wrong.
<b>9. B</b>	Both articles try to change wrong ideas about bats. A is the opposite; C and D miss the topic.
<b>10. A</b>	A title about babies points to facts about bat young — a different angle from the two given articles. The others are already in Article 1 or 2.



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
