## Quick Review

Pictures in a story can show MOOD (the feeling), SETTING (where it is), and CHARACTERS' feelings. Pictures and words work together to tell the whole story.

Imagine each described illustration. Then choose the best answer.

1. The text says, "Lila walked to school." The picture shows Lila with a big smile, sun shining, flowers everywhere. What does the picture ADD?

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## Answer Keys

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Explanations	
<b>1. B</b>	Pictures often add mood and weather details the words leave out.
<b>2. B</b>	The frown shows Sam's feeling that the words don't tell.
<b>3. A</b>	Setting is WHERE the story happens, so a picture of the place shows it. B shows feelings, C shows actions, D would give away the ending.
<b>4. B</b>	A tucked tail and a scared look add the feeling the words don't include.
<b>5. B</b>	Details in art help the reader imagine the scene clearly.
<b>6. B</b>	Setting details (stars, owl, dark sky) build mood.
<b>7. A</b>	The art reinforces (shows more strongly) what the words say.
<b>8. B</b>	Pictures show looks, clothing, and facial feelings. A is something only the words can say (we can't read thoughts in a picture); C is detail not shown by art; D would need the words.
<b>9. B</b>	The picture adds the feeling and the load that the simple sentence doesn't tell.
<b>10.</b>	<b>Answer:</b> Examples: tall trees in shadow / one small animal peeking out / a misty path / no people / soft gray light. Any sensible visual detail that helps show "quiet."



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
