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Explanations	
<b>1. B</b>	A topic sentence states a fact-based focus. A, C, D are opinions, not informative topics.
<b>2. A</b>	Plants needing water is a fact connected to the topic. The others are opinions or off-topic.
<b>3. B</b>	Nonfiction sources match informative writing. The others are fiction or entertainment.
<b>4. B</b>	“For example” adds info. However, but, instead all signal contrast or different paths.
<b>5. C</b>	C is a personal story (a narrative). The others are factual steps that fit informative writing.
<b>6.</b>	<b>Answer:</b> Example: The honeybee is an insect that does a very big job for plants and people. Any clear topic sentence about a real, fact-based subject.
<b>7.</b>	<b>Answer:</b> Example: 1) Bees gather nectar from flowers. 2) Bees turn nectar into honey inside their hive. Two facts that fit the topic.
<b>8. B</b>	A closing wraps up the topic with a strong fact-based statement. A is vague; C is silly; D is an opinion.
<b>9. B</b>	Informative = teaching with facts. The others belong to humor, opinion, and narrative writing.
<b>10.</b>	<b>Answer:</b> Example: Topic — bald eagles. Facts — (1) they are large birds of prey, (2) they have white feathers on their head, (3) they live near big lakes. Closing — bald eagles are an amazing American bird. Any clear plan with a topic, three facts, and a closing idea.



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
