Quick Review

When you read aloud, try to read at a smooth pace (not too fast, not too slow) and use **EXPRESSION** — your voice goes up at a question, gets excited at an exclamation, and pauses at commas and periods.

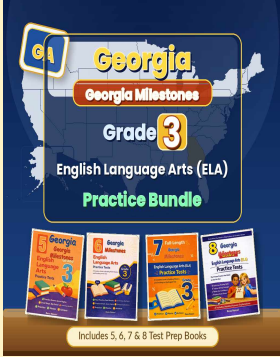

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Explanations	
1. A	Questions end with a rising voice. B is for statements; C and D are not expression patterns.
2. B	Exclamation marks call for an excited, urgent tone. A is for relaxed reading; C and D mismatch the punctuation.
3. B	The character is tired, so the tone is soft and slow. The others don't match the feeling.
4. A	Commas signal a short pause. The others are not how readers handle commas.
5. A	Too fast = unclear. The others are not true.
6. A	Too slow can lose the meaning across a sentence. The others miss the point.
7. C	“!” signals strong feeling. Commas pause, periods stop, quotation marks show speech.
8. B	Smooth, conversational pace. The others are too fast, too slow, or not about you.
9. B	Match the character's tone. The others don't fit “whispering.”
10.	Answer: Example: I would read “Look out!” in an EXCITED voice because of the exclamation mark. Any sentence + clear matching tone.



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
