Written English is usually **MORE FORMAL** than spoken English. In writing, we use complete sentences, full words (not slang), and correct punctuation. In speaking, we may use contractions and incomplete phrases.

| 1. B | Formal writing uses complete words and clear meaning. The others are casual/slang. |
| 2. B | Casual conversation uses simpler, contracted speech. |
| 3. B | Write out the full words; avoid “gonna.” |
| 4. B | Formal context = complete words and respectful tone. |
| 5. B | Casual speech uses “hey,” “wanna,” and shorter phrases. |
| 6. B | Formal letter uses a proper greeting and complete words. |
| 7. B | Couldn't = could not. Contractions are common in speech and informal writing. |
| 8. B | Formal writing uses precise, complete sentences. |
| 9. B | Correct subject + verb tense. The others have grammar errors common in casual or nonstandard speech. |
| 10. | Answer: Example: Yes, we want to play outside, so we are going to get our coats. Accept any rewrite that uses complete words and proper grammar. |



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
