### Explanations

<b>1. B</b>	The title and cover give the topic right away. The index is for finding details; the last paragraph is the end of one chapter; page numbers don't tell topic.
<b>2. B</b>	Headings act like mini-titles for sections. The other options are facts that appear elsewhere.
<b>3. B</b>	Bold marks key vocabulary or important ideas. A is fiction's job; C is the opposite; D is not why writers use bold.
<b>4. B</b>	Captions describe what is in a picture. The others describe other text features.
<b>5. C</b>	An index lists topics with page numbers. The glossary defines words but doesn't list pages for topics; the title page shows the title; the dedication is a thank-you message.
<b>6. B</b>	Glossaries are mini-dictionaries. A describes an index, C is an author bio, D is a list of illustrations.
<b>7. A</b>	Charts compare data visually. The others are not what a chart does.
<b>8. A</b>	The table of contents lists chapters with starting page numbers. The others may help with details but not with finding the first chapter.
<b>9. C</b>	Underlined blue words are hyperlinks. Headings are larger; captions sit by images; glossary entries are usually in a list.
<b>10. B</b>	Text features support reading. A is not their purpose; C is wrong — they help, not replace reading; D mixes up text features with author's opinion.



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
