A GLOSSARY is a small dictionary at the back of a book. A DICTIONARY is a longer list of words in alphabetical order. Both give the MEANING of a word; some also show how to say it and what part of speech it is.

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Explanations	
1. B	Glossaries are usually at the back. The other locations have different parts.
2. B	Always alphabetical for quick lookup.
3. A	Entries provide several pieces of information about the word.
4. A	Glossaries define topic-specific words.
5. D	G comes before H; within G: garden < globe < groove. So garden comes first.
6. A	Guide words help you flip to the right page quickly.
7. C	Part of speech tells how the word is used in a sentence.
8. B	Context decides which meaning fits.
9. B	Glossary is closer to the topic; dictionary is a backup.
10.	Answer: Example: For “gigantic” — (1) how to say it, (2) the meaning (very large), (3) the part of speech (adjective). Any three accurate dictionary-entry items.



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
