## Quick Review

In nonfiction, you'll meet special words about a topic — like “habitat” in a science article. Use the other sentences around the word as CLUES to figure out the meaning. The text often defines or hints at the word right next to it.

### PART 1 — READ

Read the passage. Then answer the questions.

#### Animals of the Desert

A desert is a very dry place that gets little rain. Many people think deserts are always hot, but some deserts are cold at night. The plants and animals that live there have special features that help them survive in this tough habitat.

Camels are well known for living in hot deserts. Their wide feet help them walk on loose sand. They store fat in their humps, which gives them energy when food and water are scarce. Camels can also drink huge amounts of water at one time and use it slowly over many days.

Smaller desert animals stay safe by being nocturnal — they are active at night, when the air is cooler. During the heat of the day, lizards and snakes find shade or burrow into the sand to avoid losing too much water. These adaptations help desert animals live where many other animals cannot.

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Explanations	
<b>1. B</b>	The sentence calls the desert a “tough habitat” for animals and plants — so habitat = place where they live. A, C, D do not fit the sentence.
<b>2. B</b>	The sentence says camels use their humps when food and water are scarce — meaning hard to find. A,C,D do not fit the cause-and-effect of needing stored fat.
<b>3. B</b>	The text defines it next to the word: nocturnal — active at night when the air is cooler. A is opposite; C and D are unrelated.
<b>4. B</b>	Burrowing INTO sand means digging in. A is the opposite direction; C and D do not match the action.
<b>5. D</b>	Paragraph 3 ends with “these adaptations.” Features is close but more general; humps and shade are specific things.
<b>6. B</b>	“Tough” = hard, difficult. The whole passage shows why life is hard in deserts. The others contradict the text.
<b>7. A</b>	Store = save up (the camel uses the fat for energy later). B is the other meaning of “store” (a shop); C and D are opposite or unrelated.
<b>8. D</b>	Right after “scarce,” the text explains that the fat gives them energy when food and water are hard to find. The other words don’t define scarce.
<b>9.</b>	<b>Answer:</b> Example: A camel’s wide feet are an adaptation that helps it walk on sand. Any correct use of the word with a desert-animal example.
<b>10. C</b>	Domain-specific words name science ideas precisely. A, B, D are not why the writer picks these words.



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
