

Points, Lines, Line Segments, and Rays

A point marks a location. A line goes forever in two directions. A segment has two endpoints. A ray has one endpoint and goes forever in the other direction.

Term	Endpoints	Goes forever?	Symbol
Point	—	no	$\cdot A$
Line	0	yes (both ways)	\overleftrightarrow{AB}
Line segment	2	no	\overline{AB}
Ray	1	yes (one way)	\overrightarrow{AB}

Key Concepts

1. A **point** is an exact location. It has no size.
2. A **line** goes on forever in both directions. It's drawn with arrows on both ends.
3. A **line segment** has two endpoints and a fixed length.
4. A **ray** starts at one point and goes on forever in one direction. Think of a flashlight beam.

Worked Examples

① What has two endpoints and does not go on forever?

 Two endpoints + finite length = line segment.

 **Answer:** *Line segment*

② How many endpoints does a ray have?

 A ray starts at one point and goes forever in one direction. So 1 endpoint.

 **Answer:** 1

③ Name a real-life example of a line segment.

 Anything with a definite start and a definite end. Examples: the edge of a ruler, a pencil, the side of a desk, a piece of yarn.

 **Answer:** *The edge of a ruler*

Study Tips

☞ Look at the symbol above the letters: \overline{AB} has no arrows (segment), \overrightarrow{AB} has one arrow (ray), \overleftrightarrow{AB} has two arrows (line).

☞ “Goes forever” is the key idea for lines and rays. Anything you can measure with a ruler is a segment.

☞ Real-world examples help: a wall edge (segment), a flashlight beam (ray), an idealized straight road that never ends (line).

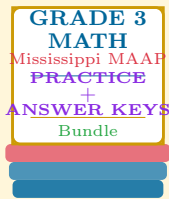
