## Quick Review

A Grade 4 opinion piece has four jobs: (1) introduce the topic and state a clear opinion, (2) support it with reasons backed by facts and details, (3) link opinion and reasons with words like *for instance*, *in order to*, *in addition*, *specifically*, and (4) wrap up with a strong concluding statement.

## PART 1 — READ

Read the passage. Then answer the questions.

### Student draft — “Why Our School Should Start a Library Club”

Our school should start a library club because it would help readers grow and bring kids together. First, a library club would give us more time with books we love. In addition, members could share recommendations, which is one of the best ways to discover a new favorite series.

Second, a club would help readers who struggle. For instance, older members could read with younger ones once a week. Specifically, a fourth grader could partner with a first grader for ten minutes after lunch. In order to make this work, our librarian would only need a small sign-up sheet.

Finally, a library club would bring kids together around something quiet and kind. In addition to reading, members could plan a yearly book fair to raise money for new titles. For all of these reasons, the principal should start a library club this fall — our school would be a better place for it.

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Explanations	
<b>1. B</b>	B is the THESIS: topic + position + preview of reasons, placed up front. A sounds like an opinion but is not in the draft. C is a supporting reason. D is the concluding restatement, not the main opinion statement.
<b>2. B</b>	<i>Specifically</i> narrows to a concrete instance (a fourth grader and a first grader). <i>In addition</i> stacks another reason, <i>Finally</i> marks the last reason, and <i>In order to</i> signals purpose.
<b>3. A</b>	A introduces a NEW REASON (reading routine) that supports the opinion. B is an on-topic fact but doesn't argue for the club. C is a personal weakness, not a reason. D is on-topic but is a side fact, not a reason to start the club.
<b>4. C</b>	Strong support uses FACTS. C is a sweeping personal opinion with no source. A, B, and D are countable, verifiable facts that strengthen the argument.
<b>5. B</b>	The blank connects a CLAIM to its REASON, so <i>because</i> fits. <i>However</i> and <i>although</i> signal contrast (wrong relationship); <i>instead</i> signals replacement, which doesn't fit either.
<b>6. A</b>	A restates the opinion firmly AND sums up the reasons — the job of an opinion conclusion. B is balanced/neutral (better for an informative piece). C hedges and weakens the stance. D is an off-topic historical fact.
<b>7. D</b>	<i>In addition</i> stacks another reason of the same kind. <i>On the other hand</i> and <i>In contrast</i> signal opposition; <i>Even though</i> introduces a concession, not a new supporting reason.
<b>8. D</b>	Opinions use judgment words like <i>most welcoming</i> and cannot be verified by counting or checking a schedule. A, B, and C are all measurable, verifiable facts.
<b>9.</b>	<b>Answer:</b> Examples: (1) I believe our school should give students twenty minutes of silent reading every afternoon. (2) Our school should add a vegetable choice at every lunch. (3) I believe fourth graders should have a class job rotation each week. Accept any single sentence that (a) names a topic and (b) states a clear position. NOT acceptable: a question, a fact-only sentence (e.g., "Our school has 400 students"), or a balanced sentence that takes no side.
<b>10.</b>	<b>Answer:</b> Examples: (1) In addition, silent reading lets every student practice every day, no matter their reading level. Specifically, twenty minutes adds up to almost two extra hours of practice each week. (2) For instance, students who read daily score higher on state reading tests. In order to build that habit at school, we need a protected time block. Accept any two reasons that support the opinion from item 9, each introduced with a DIFFERENT linking phrase from the list. NOT acceptable: two reasons with the same linking word, or one reason restated twice.



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
