Quick Review

An **idiom** is a phrase whose meaning isn't the literal meaning of its words (*spill the beans* = reveal a secret). An **adage** is a short, well-known saying that gives advice (*A stitch in time saves nine*). A **proverb** is similar — a short saying that states a general truth (*The early bird catches the worm*). Don't read these literally!

Choose the meaning of each idiom, adage, or proverb as it would be understood by an English speaker. Distractors include LITERAL readings and other near-sounding sayings.

1. What does the idiom *spill the beans* most likely mean?

Explanations	
1. C	spill the beans = reveal a secret. A and B are literal misreadings (no real beans involved); D confuses sharing food with sharing information.
2. A	The proverb warns: don't make plans based on something that hasn't happened yet. B, C, and D all read the chicken/egg image literally and miss the life advice.
3. B	raining cats and dogs = raining very heavily. A and D add story details that aren't there; C reads the idiom literally (it isn't actually raining animals).
4. D	The adage gives advice: fix a small problem early to avoid a bigger one later. A, B, and C all stay too close to the literal sewing image.
5. A	break the ice = start a friendly conversation in an awkward situation (the awkwardness is the <i>ice</i>). B is the literal action; C and D add unrelated details.
6. C	The proverb means people who start early have an advantage. A and B describe bird/worm habits literally; D reads the food image too literally.
7. B	let the cat out of the bag = accidentally reveal a secret. Compare with <i>spill the beans</i> , which is on purpose; this idiom suggests an accident. A is literal; C is unrelated; D mixes up cause and effect.
8. D	The adage means don't judge people or things by appearance alone. A, B, and C all stay literal — they're about real books, missing the wider message.
9. A	under the weather = feeling slightly sick. B is the literal image; C and D describe other physical or emotional states.
10. C	The proverb means what you do matters more than what you say. A, B, and D all read <i>louder</i> as literal volume and miss the comparison of deeds vs. talk.
