## Quick Review

Inside ONE sentence or ONE paragraph, keep the verb tense consistent. A shift is okay only when the time really changes (a flashback, a future prediction). Watch for half-shifts: when only one verb in a list slips into a different tense. To fix, decide on ONE time frame and rewrite every verb to match.

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Explanations	
<b>1. D</b>	D mixes past 'opened' with present 'steps' — a half-shift. A keeps both verbs in past, B keeps both in present, and C keeps both in future. Each of A, B, and C uses ONE time frame consistently.
<b>2. B</b>	B keeps both verbs in simple past ('twirled' and 'leaped'). A mixes past + present, C mixes present + past, and D mixes future + past. Only B is consistent.
<b>3. A</b>	Two of the three verbs are past ('opened', 'started'), so fix the single mismatched verb: 'thinks' → 'thought'. B and C would mean changing TWO verbs instead of ONE, and they pick the wrong time frame. D shifts to future, which doesn't match the past narration.
<b>4. C</b>	C uses simple past for ALL three verbs ('rang', 'hurried', 'grabbed'). A and B each leave one verb in present. D shifts the first verb to future and keeps the third in present — two errors.
<b>5. D</b>	D jumps present 'visit' → past 'baked' → present 'pours' — two shifts in one sentence. A is all present, B is all past, and C is all future. Only D contains inappropriate shifts.
<b>6. B</b>	'Last weekend' fixes the time as past, so all four verbs must be past: 'hiked, was, got, saw'. B does this. A keeps 'get' and 'see' in present. C and D mix tenses across sentences.
<b>7. A</b>	A keeps all three verbs in simple past ('began', 'dimmed', 'cheered'). B leaves 'begins' in present; C leaves 'dim' in present; D leaves 'cheers' in present. Only A is fully consistent.
<b>8. C</b>	Match the LATER verb to the earlier one. 'Packed' is past, so change 'reminds' → 'reminded'. A would shift to present (you'd then need to change 'reminds' too — extra work). B makes a subject-verb agreement error ('Mom remind'). D introduces a future tense not in the original.
<b>9. D</b>	A general 'if' rule pairs simple present with simple present — D is consistent. A pairs present with past, B pairs past with present, and C uses 'will' inside the if-clause AND mixes with past 'got'.
<b>10.</b>	<b>Answer:</b> Past version: 'Jordan grabbed his backpack and ran to the bus stop. He waved at his neighbor and climbed aboard.' Present version: 'Jordan grabs his backpack and runs to the bus stop. He waves at his neighbor and climbs aboard.' Accept either an all-past version OR an all-present version. Mark wrong if any verb is left in the other tense (a half-shift), or if the student introduces a future tense ('will grab') not in the original.



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
