## Quick Review

Find the TRUE subject (not a noun inside a prepositional phrase), then make the verb match in number. Indefinite pronouns 'each, every, everyone, everybody, neither, either' take SINGULAR verbs. 'Both, few, many, several' take PLURAL verbs. Collective nouns (team, family, class) usually take a singular verb when acting as one unit. With 'one of the X who...' the verb agrees with the plural noun (X).

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Explanations	
<b>1. A</b>	The TRUE subject is 'box' (singular) — 'of crayons' is just a prepositional phrase. Singular subject takes 'is'. B, C, and D all make the same error: agreeing with the plural 'crayons' inside the prepositional phrase.
<b>2. C</b>	'Everyone' is always singular → 'is'. A, B, and D agree with the plural 'classes' inside the prepositional phrase, but 'classes' is NOT the subject.
<b>3. B</b>	'Neither' is singular → 'is'. A, C, and D agree with the plural 'answers' (object of 'of'), but the SUBJECT is 'neither'.
<b>4. D</b>	In 'there is/are' sentences, the verb agrees with what FOLLOWS — 'twelve eggs' is plural, so 'are'. A and B use singular verbs. C uses 'has', which makes a different (wrong) sentence.
<b>5. A</b>	'Team' is a collective noun acting as ONE unit → singular 'practices'. B uses plural 'practice'. C is grammatically broken ('are practice'). D would mean 'have a practice' (different meaning).
<b>6. C</b>	'Who' refers to 'students' (plural) → 'play'. The MAIN verb 'is' matches the singular 'one'. A wrongly uses singular 'plays' for 'who'. B wrongly uses past 'was'. D wrongly uses plural 'are' for 'one'.
<b>7. B</b>	'Each' is singular → 'has'. A and C agree with the plural 'runners' in the prepositional phrase. D uses plural past 'were'.
<b>8. D</b>	Subject = 'pack' (singular collective) → 'howls'. A and B agree with 'wolves' inside the prepositional phrase. C is grammatically broken ('were howl').
<b>9. C</b>	'Both' is always plural → 'live'. A uses singular 'lives'. B uses singular 'has'. D uses singular 'is'.
<b>10. is</b>	Subject = 'bowl' (singular). 'Of fresh strawberries' is a prepositional phrase, not the subject. Correct verb: 'is'. Mark wrong: 'are' or 'have' (agreeing with the plural strawberries) and 'has' (wrong main-verb meaning here).



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
