Quick Review

Pick ONE person and ONE number and stick with it. A NUMBER shift happens when a singular antecedent (a student, everyone, each person) is followed by a plural pronoun (they, their). A PERSON shift happens when you start in third person ('a student', 'one', 'people') and switch to second person ('you'). Fix it by making both sides plural OR by keeping both sides in the same person.

7. Read the paragraph: 'A student who wants to do well on the test should plan ahead. You should make a study schedule and stick to it.' What is the BEST way to revise it?
- A. Change 'A student' to 'You' in the first sentence.
 - B. Change 'should plan ahead' to 'should plans ahead'.
 - C. Change 'a student' to 'students' and 'You' to 'They'.

8. Which sentence is correct?

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Explanations	
1. C	C starts with the third-person 'a student' and shifts to second-person 'you' — a classic person shift. A stays in third-person plural ('students...they'). B stays in second-person throughout ('you...you'). D stays in third-person formal ('one...one').
2. A	The original starts in third-person ('a person'). Keep the same person: 'he or she'. A fixes the shift. B switches the FIRST clause to 'you' but then jumps to 'they' — two shifts in one sentence. C uses 'one', which mismatches 'a person' (a different register). D leaves 'you' in the second clause, so the shift remains.
3. D	'All of the volunteers' is plural, so plural 'their' matches — no shift. A, B, and C all pair singular indefinite pronouns ('every athlete', 'each', 'everyone') with the plural 'their'. Grade 6 standards test traditional singular agreement.
4. B	The cleanest fix is to make BOTH sides plural: 'Readers...they'. B does this. A still mixes singular antecedent 'a reader' with plural 'they' (a number shift). C reverses the shift but still has one (you → a reader). D mixes formal 'one' with 'you' (a person shift).
5. C	C shifts from third-person 'one' to second-person 'you' — a person shift. A stays in first-person plural ('we...we'). B stays in third-person plural ('students...they'). D stays in second-person ('you...you').
6. A	A is fully consistent: plural antecedent 'runners' + plural 'they/their'. B shifts from third-person 'a runner' to second-person 'you'. C pairs singular 'each runner' with plural 'they/their' (number shift). D shifts from formal 'one' to 'you' (person shift).
7. D	D rewrites BOTH sentences in third-person plural — no shift, no awkward 'he or she' repetition. A creates a different shift (second-person throughout the second sentence but still mixes tone). B introduces a subject-verb error. C names the right idea but is harder to apply cleanly than D's full rewrite.
8. B	'Neither' is singular, so the pronoun must be singular. The antecedents are both male ('boys'), so 'his' is correct. A uses plural 'their' with singular 'neither' (number shift). C shifts to first-person 'our'. D uses second-person 'you' as a possessive — wrong form AND wrong person.
9. C	C shifts from third-person 'a hiker' (singular) to second-person 'you' (and also a number shift). A is consistent (people...they). B is consistent (we...our). D is consistent (travelers...their).



10. **Answer:** When soccer players join a new team, they have to learn the coach's signals. They also need to introduce themselves to their teammates.
The original has multiple shifts: third-person 'a soccer player' → second-person 'you' → 'they' → second-person 'yourself/your'. The cleanest fix is to start plural and stay plural: 'soccer players...they...themselves...their'. Accept any version that keeps every pronoun in third-person plural and fixes 'yourself' to 'themselves'. Mark wrong if any 'you', 'your', or 'yourself' is left in the paragraph, or if the student keeps singular 'a soccer player' with plural 'they'.



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
