The Case for Dark Skies

For many people, city night means a pale orange glow instead of a sky full of stars. That glow, called light pollution, comes from outdoor lighting that shines upward or sideways instead of only where it is needed.

Light pollution affects more than stargazing. Migrating birds can become disoriented by bright buildings, sea turtle hatchlings may crawl toward streetlights instead of the ocean, and people can lose sleep when glare spills into windows.

Some cities have begun using shielded fixtures, warmer bulbs, and motion sensors. These changes do not require streets to become dark or unsafe. They aim light downward, where people need it, and reduce wasted energy.

Protecting dark skies is therefore not only an astronomy issue. It is a practical effort to support wildlife, human health, and efficient public lighting.

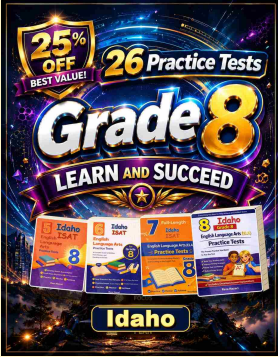
