Informational evidence should prove a claim precisely. Prefer data, causal language, and exact statements over details that are merely related.

How Satellites Track Wildfires

When a wildfire begins in a remote forest, ground crews may not see it immediately. Satellites help close that gap by scanning wide areas for heat signatures that differ from the surrounding land.

Infrared sensors can detect unusually warm spots even through some smoke. Computers compare new images with earlier images of the same location, helping analysts decide whether a bright signal is a fire, a factory, or sun-warmed rock.

The information does not replace firefighters or local observers. Instead, it gives them a faster map of where danger may be growing, especially at night or in hard-to-reach terrain.

As climate change lengthens fire seasons, agencies increasingly combine satellite data, weather forecasts, and reports from people on the ground to decide where to send crews first.

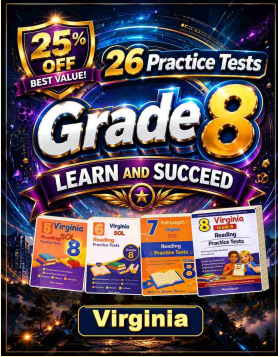
