## Quick Review

Structure is part of meaning. Compare how the order, pacing, and form of two texts shape what readers notice and feel.

### PART 1 — READ

Read the passage. Then answer the questions.

## Two Ways to Tell the Storm

Text 1: In the story version, the storm arrives slowly. First, the fishing boats turn toward shore. Then gulls flatten themselves against the wind, and shopkeepers carry signs indoors. By the time the first hard rain strikes the pier, Liana has already decided to search for her brother's missing radio.

Text 2: In the poem version, the storm speaks in fragments: Net. Nail. Tin roof. Bell. The lines are short, and each image lands like a separate drop. Liana is mentioned only once, near the end, running toward the pier with the radio strap across her shoulder.

Both versions tell the same event, but they make the reader wait in different ways. The story builds a chain of causes; the poem creates pressure through compressed images.

In both versions, Liana is brave. Yet the story explains her choice, while the poem makes the choice feel sudden and almost wordless.



### Explanations

1. B	The correct evidence directly proves the stated inference rather than merely mentioning the same topic.

4. D	The correct answer explains the role the detail plays in the development of the text.

6. A	A strong summary includes the main conflict or idea and the outcome without personal opinion.
7. C	This choice overstates or invents an idea that the passage does not prove.
8. D	This detail is specific enough to support analysis in a written response.
