The Printing Press and Public Debate

Before movable-type printing spread through Europe, books were copied slowly by hand. Because copies were scarce and expensive, new arguments traveled unevenly and often stayed within small circles.

Printing changed that pattern. Pamphlets, essays, and translated books could be produced in larger numbers, allowing religious reformers, scientists, and political critics to reach audiences they would never meet.

The change did not make public debate calmer. In fact, quicker printing often intensified conflict because opposing writers could answer one another rapidly and publicly.

Still, the press altered the relationship between knowledge and authority. Ideas became harder to control once readers could compare competing claims for themselves.

1. B	The correct evidence directly proves the stated inference rather than merely mentioning the same topic.
2. A	The correct answer covers the whole passage, while the distractors are too narrow, too extreme, or unsupported.
3. C	The context around the word points to this meaning in this passage.
4. D	The correct answer explains the role the detail plays in the development of the text.
5. B	The correct conclusion follows from multiple details, not from a single isolated word.
6. A	A strong summary includes the main conflict or idea and the outcome without personal opinion.
7. C	This choice overstates or invents an idea that the passage does not prove.
8. D	This detail is specific enough to support analysis in a written response.

Answer: A strong response quotes or closely paraphrases: Pamphlets, essays, and translated books could be produced in larger numbers, allowing religious reformers, scientists, and political critics to reach audiences they would never meet. 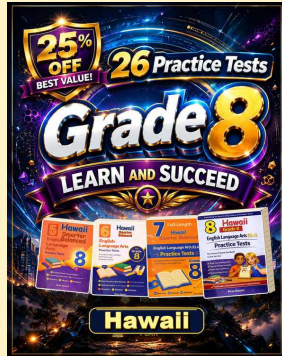


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
