Quick Review

Modern works often borrow a pattern from myth, folklore, or traditional stories, then change the setting, conflict, or character choice to make new meaning.

A New Thread for Ari

Ari joined the city design contest with a problem no one wanted: the subway station under City Hall confused even lifelong residents. Hallways doubled back, signs pointed toward closed exits, and commuters joked that the station had swallowed whole afternoons.

Her brother called it a maze. Ari smiled because she had been reading the old myth of Ariadne, who gives Theseus a thread so he can escape the labyrinth. But Ari did not want to be the person waiting outside the maze. She wanted to redesign it.

For three weeks, she walked every route with colored yarn in her pocket, tying temporary lines from platform to exit until patterns appeared. Then she replaced the yarn with painted floor paths: blue to trains, green to street exits, gold to elevators.

The judges praised the design for being simple. Ari thought of the myth and disagreed. A thread was not simple if it helped people stop feeling lost.

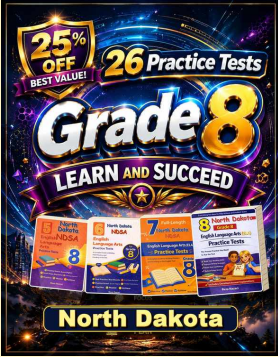

Explanations

1. B	The correct evidence directly proves the stated inference rather than merely mentioning the same topic.
