A theme is a full idea about life, not a topic word. An objective summary reports the story's main turning points without praise, blame, or personal reaction.

The Map of Detours

Nico planned routes the way some people planned birthday parties. His notebook held train schedules, bus numbers, walking times, and backup plans written in careful boxes. When his aunt asked him to lead his visiting cousins across the city to the science museum, Nico drew the fastest path in blue ink and felt ready.

Two blocks from the station, construction closed the sidewalk. Then the bus they needed hissed past without stopping. His cousins began to complain, and Nico felt his perfect plan narrowing like a hallway. At the corner, an older street musician pointed them toward a small ferry that crossed the river behind the market. It was not on Nico's map.

The ferry moved slowly. From the deck, the cousins saw murals under the bridge, herons standing in the reeds, and the museum dome shining ahead like a coin. Nico wanted to call the route inefficient, but his youngest cousin whispered that this was the best part of the day.

That night, Nico opened his notebook and redrew the route. He kept the blue line, but beside it he added a green one labeled detour worth taking.



1. B	The correct evidence directly proves the stated inference rather than merely mentioning the same topic.

8. D	This detail is specific enough to support analysis in a written response.

Then it explains how that detail proves the inference instead of only repeating it. Use exact wording from the text or task, then explain your reasoning.
