Rain at the Theater Door

The rain did not fall; it auditioned. It tapped the theater awning, whispered along the ticket window, and then burst into applause against the alley cans. Theo stood under the lights with his trumpet case, pretending not to read the cast list taped inside the glass.

His name was not there. The empty space where he had expected it seemed to glow. Around him, students shrieked and hugged, their happiness bright enough to make him feel ungrateful for needing to look away.

Then Mara, who had earned the lead, stepped outside. She did not offer the easy comfort of saying the judges were wrong. Instead she said, I heard you practicing the bridge after everyone left. No one works like that by accident.

Theo listened to the rain soften from applause to a steady hush. He picked up the trumpet case and followed Mara back inside for rehearsal, where the understudy list waited beneath the first page.

1. B	The correct evidence directly proves the stated inference rather than merely mentioning the same topic.
2. A	The correct answer covers the whole passage, while the distractors are too narrow, too extreme, or unsupported.
3. C	The context around the word points to this meaning in this passage.
4. D	The correct answer explains the role the detail plays in the development of the text.
5. B	The correct conclusion follows from multiple details, not from a single isolated word.
6. A	A strong summary includes the main conflict or idea and the outcome without personal opinion.
7. C	This choice overstates or invents an idea that the passage does not prove.
8. D	This detail is specific enough to support analysis in a written response.
9.	Answer: A strong response quotes or closely paraphrases: Theo stood under the lights with his trumpet case, pretending not to read the cast list taped inside the glass. Then it explains how that detail proves the inference instead of only repeating it. Use exact wording from the text or task, then explain your reasoning.
10.	Answer: A strong response states: A setback can hurt deeply while still leaving room for persistence and dignity. It supports the statement with a precise detail such as: Theo stood under the lights with his trumpet case, pretending not to read the cast list taped inside the glass. Use exact wording from the text or task, then explain your reasoning.



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
